During these 18 years I have found that we all share a school of striking distinction.




I am confident that NCEA will become a far more appropriate qualification for today's students and one that, given time will allow them to tailor their courses and qualifications to their own needs.



Tokoroa people are very loyal to their town and defend it vigorously when they are on the receiving end of biased, uninformed comment. The comments usually come from people with little or no knowledge of the town, but "they've read about it in the newspapers." Often the perception of Tokoroa is that it is a wild, lawless place full of industrial unrest and uncertainty.

Of course Tokoroa has its problems and we have always lived with a degree of uncertainty and unrest. But out of this has come a certain strength and the resolve to keep going and succeed. The Tokoroa spirit is something that only people who have lived in the town understand.

The Tokoroa spirit has always been an integral part of Tokoroa High School, but uninformed perceptions still exist about the schools in Tokoroa. Close friends of Michael visited his parents to offer help and support.


They then decided to get together and print out 500 yellow and black cards with the words "It's OK to ask for help", which was a quote from Michael's mother after the tragedy.



What a day!!


As usual, the Tokoroa students did well with Tim's group coming first and Tamielle's second.

Each person in the group was given a certain role that gave them some sort of understanding of what it would be like in the world of business.


Three experienced helpers from Lion Nathan encouraged students and helped wherever help was needed.






soothing atmosphere.

Year 13 Biology Trip To Auckland Zoo




Year 13 Physics — Trip To Rainbow's End

Nicole Petero put in a solid effort to set two new records in the 100m and long jump, to secure the Intermediate Girls title.



Clint Jowett became Senior Boys champ with four 1sts.





gutsy performances. The year ended well with a massive win over Te Kauwhata, with Tim Colliar taking a career best 7-23.



became addicts. They even rode in atrocious weather and conditions.


