





The Principal's Message

This year has been a tough year for the school with the fire and changes in a number of areas in the school. At least half of E block burnt down and the rest of the block was water damaged. Many of our staff and students gave up their holidays to ensure teaching could commence day one of Term 3. In a couple of cases staff worked through their weekends as well.

During the year we also faced the passing on of some of our people who died. As a school we would like to pass on our support and regards to the families in our school community who have recently suffered a bereavement. Our thoughts and prayers are with those who have suffered and lost a loved one or friend. Arohanui, Tokoroa High School

This year was the third year of NCEA and the second year of 15 plus in every subject as the focus for learning. The emphasis on "Student Achievement" was aligned with energy and effort with a focus on NCEA results, attendance, and literacy.

Many of the changes already mentioned will be developed in more depth through this magazine. Thanks to Ms Miller for the editing and putting this magazine together.

Student Results and Activities

In 2004 the school population increased by 20% with Tokoroa High School being the school of choice for year 8 students coming to secondary school. Our academic results were much improved from previous years with literacy of 64% and numeracy of 67% at level one NCEA. Out of the 10 or so candidates sitting there were 3 scholarships. Senior Te Reo students started studying at university, through the video conferencing equipment. In the Young Enterprise Scheme students won the regional oral presentation. One of our departments has close to a 100% pass rate in NCEA. Our students enjoy reading,

76% of students entered in the local Library Odyssey Teen Reading Programme were from Tokoroa High School. We compete in the Waikato wide Math competitions usually getting in the top half. The vast majority of our staff are hard working. Last year for instance, there were 48 extra NCEA subject classes run by staff every week or in the lunchtime or in the weekend for students wanting to improve their results. Thanks teachers for making sure this year was successful for our students.

Sports Activities

Students were successful in regional, national and in some cases international competitions in wood chopping and sawing, cricket, touch rugby, boys and girls rugby, swimming, athletics, cross country, judo, soccer, music, basketball, eight ball, and netball. The Senior Boys swimming team came second in the Waikato regional competitions including all the Hamilton Schools. The senior Netball team were in the premier competition for the first time in years enjoying success against Taumarunui and Forest View. Girl's rugby team played in the local and regional competitions winning every game. The under 14 Rugby team came second in the premier competition for the whole of the Waikato Region.

Cultural Activities

Regional and national participation occurred with the groups in Kapahaka, Puna via ora, jazz, brass band, rock bands, drama and Shakespeare competitions. In art in the regional competitions held in Otorohanga, Tokoroa High School students were placed first and third. Music students produce their own CD's and complete in regional and national band competitions. The school council has run excellent socials and student activities. SADD and Yellow Ribbon Support are organized by students. Our students came 2nd and 3rd in regional Manu Korero. Weekend after weekend staff are in the school with the students in music, art, sport, culture, many of which are building to NCEA. Our international contacts continued with students going to or coming from Chile, Germany, Malaysia, Colombia, panama, Spain, Belgium, china, Australia, cook islands, Fiji, Samoa, South Africa.

Community Support

The fire was a real down but on the other hand the community support was amazing. Huffer T-Shirts designed by Dan Buckley and sold at Morrissey's were highly sort after items. The Te Wananga o Aotearoa ran a fantastic "Fun raising" evening. We received hundreds of letters, e-mails ad offers of finance. One group of 25 parents has raised \$17,000 for children to attend university in the student's holidays. The Golf club ran a fund raising tournament. Many, many letter and actions of support and funding have come from all over the country. Thanks people.

Lastly thanks to the staff, parents, student, and my colleagues in the administration who have made this, such a good year in spite of the fire. Awesome team effort people.

To the students and families of Tokoroa High School, thank you for patience this year and rest assured we will hit the ground running for next year.





E Block's Destruction

Term Two had finished well. Student behaviour had been commended and staff felt pleased with their efforts. Everyone was looking forward to a well earned holiday. However, Friday July 2nd was not to be the start of a carefree holiday break as anticipated. Instead it marked the beginning of a disastrous event which would change the face of Tokoroa High School as a report from the Waikato Times states:

"The fire was small but ravenous. It consumed fuel immediately around it and sought more, licking at the classrooms' painted walls, thin carpet, paper and lacquered wood.

The fire crackled upwards as black, chemical-laden smoke rolled along the ceiling of E Block. When the 111 call came on the night of July 2nd the historic two –storey classroom block was well ablaze.

Bill Ramsay had been asleep an hour when his pager went off at 11.45pm. Simultaneously, the senior volunteer firefighter got his usual adrenalin rush on hearing the mournful sound of the siren at Tokoroa fire station.

Minutes later, as he drove the first fire appliance up the hill towards the school, Ramsay could see a glow in the sky and hear old fibrolite starting to bang.

He knew the school well. His two children had been students there. So had some of the other firefighters. As he drew closer, Ramsay could see flames surging clear of the second storey roof. Soon there was a spaghetti junction of hoses, as about thirty firefighters from three South Waikato towns arrived.

The height of the building made fighting the fire difficult but, masterminded by chief lan Wellings, the textbook plan worked. Men armed with hoses stormed up the stairwell furtherest form the fire, turning the flames back on themselves. When the fire was out, Ramsay and his team stayed on site all night dampening down.

At daybreak, he watched people come to see the fire's smouldering aftermath, teachers in tears at the loss of four classrooms, including that of the school's special needs students. Eight other classrooms, including in the 47year old E Block were damaged by fire, water or smoke.

For past pupils and some current teachers of the school, the scene on the following morning brought back some bitter memories of a night in February 1987, when two fourteen year old girls – one from T.H.S. – torched and destroyed the single storey C block. The replacement C Block stands as a testament to the resilience of the school."(unquote)

The same resilience and determination was again shown. Staff swang into action in a military style operation to salvage books and equipment from the ruins of E block. Once this was completed, the huge job of preparing the disused Matarawa classrooms in readiness for Term 3 began in earnest. Principal, Mr. Edwards led the daily briefings of the management team and key staff worked throughout the holidays to have everything in place for the start of term. Head of PE, Mr B. Reid along with his trusty right hand man, student Steven Ryan ferried equipment and furniture from one site to another and worked tirelessly attending to the myriad of details required to get the rooms ready. A core group of staff, attended every meeting and were always on hand to support other staff and students. This, along with all the other support the school received, has been heart-warming and

encouraging. Staff waistlines were in danger out getting out of control in the first two weeks of Term 3 as schools and businesses generously provided sumptuous morning teas day after day.

We are all enormously grateful for the wonderful support Tokoroa High School has received from all over the country. Thank you all.

Just as our new buildings at the front of the school will remind us of the destructive fire of July 2004, they will also stand as a monument to people's resilience in the face of adversity.

In July, 2003, our School fare welled into retirement one of its finest and long serving teacher of almost 30 years.

On 7th April, 2004, Nikorima Guy Morgan lost his fight for life peacefully at his home.

Mr Morgan was born at Omahu, a small settlement just outside Hastings on the 23rd December, 1933. He was the first son of Nikorima Kupa and Erena Kupa-Bird.

When he was three months old, he was taken by Hemi Mokena (Morgan) and Ani Paora Mokena back to Bridge Pa and raised as their son. A maori family with a strong faith in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter day Saints or Mormons.

Mr Morgan attended Hastings High School, Napier Boys High School and later Hastings Boys High School. An exceptional sporting talent in Rugby, Tennis and Athletics, he was keenly followed by his parents.

When Mr Morgan left School, he attended Ardmore Teachers Training College where he met and married one of Ruatonga's (Rarotonga) beauties, Teupoko Ina Utanga.

Mr Morgan's loyalty to his new family took him on his first trip overseas to Rarotonga from 1957-1962 teaching at Nikao Maori School and where he helped elevate his adopted home of Avatiu-Ruatonga from sporting minnows to champions.

From 1968 to 1972, Mr and Mrs Morgan were inseparable and both taught at Levuka Public School in Fiji. Their joint interest there was the production of a Fijian folk opera 'Rakauvono' for the 1972 South Pacific Festival of Arts in Suva.

Upon their return to New Zealand, Mr and Mrs Morgan taught at Naike School in Huntly before settling for Tokoroa High School in 1976.

Mr Morgan's expertise in people management, numeracy and literacy was put to effective use when he was appointed to pilot the highly successful work experience unit. His work is ingrained in our community of Tokoroa through the many students he taught. Mr Morgan will be remembered for many more years to come.

Mr Morgan is survived by his sons James, Tony, Glenn and Natha, daughter Tania, in-laws and all his precious grandchildren.



¥ Jenny Cook- 8 ball world champs






Day Classes

It has been a busy and successful year for many adult students who enrolled in our day class programme. Peter Blochs NZQA computing course attracted 22 enrolments during the year and over 200 units were achieved. Other popular subjects were Mathematics and English, with one adult enrolment in Social Studies.

Night Classes

On average 25 night classes operated each term attracting over 1400 adult enrolments. Most popular courses this year were computing for beginners and making beautiful mosaics with Vicky Kopu and Rona Mason. Two successful weekend workshops were held on stained glass (lead lighting) and day classes in remedial Math's and English were also run. Night classes are formerly run under the Ministry of Education are now managed by the Tertiary Education Commission and the transition this year has been a smooth and successful one. Most popular certificated course this year were Defensive Driving and Welding.



Our second mission was to get the message out there to the school community. This was done through our Yellow Ribbon launch which was held on August 14 which was a success because of all the fun and games that went on. 

Gateway comes to THS

The Gateway programme was officially launched in the South Waikato in December 2003. The programme is for senior school students (Years 12. and 13) at the three local secondary schools; Forest View, Putaruru, and Tokoroa High Schools. Its focus is to support senior students while they clarify and explore their possible work and career options. Through Gateway, students go on a structured work placement in their area of interest with an employer in the community for a set period of time. This experience helps the student to check if this work is in their area of interest and at the same time gives the employer a chance to see if the student could be a possible employee with their business.

The Gateway programme started at the three secondary schools in February this year, and nearly twenty five students from Tokoroa High School have been placed with a wide range of businesses in the South Waikato community this year. The students have risen to the challenge and enjoyed the experience. Employers are supportive of the programme and the students, and are happy to have students who are 'courteous, enthusiastic and willing to learn.'

Students involved in Gateway are required to gain a minimum of 10 credits from their Gateway placement.

Year 12 and 13 students wishing to be considered for the Gateway Programme must have excellent attendance records and meet school expectations regarding uniform and productivity.

Students must apply to the HOD Achievement/ Transition for inclusion in this programme.


Project K Students: 2003







The students are developing their skills and discipline with the 'huakau' or quarter-staff.

Three original students, Jordan Monk, Damian Gray and Tremaine Te Miha, began their formal training in October of 2003 and are currently ranked as Tauira-Horomata (fourth-order learners). Ngarimu Hapi and Kennedy Stainton are ranked as Taura (second-order learners). Waka Ropiha, Rongo Jensen, and Tulsa McGlone are Pia (first-order learners) and have also recently started in Term 4.

The commitment of these students has been demonstrated by their attendance for training at 6:00 a.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays mornings. The students train together with other local adults, as well as, other students from Mangakino. This interest in martial arts has unified youth from two communities under one vision, that of living at peace one with another, despite their differences.

The vision that underpins the students training is stated as follows:

Kia TImaua te Huakau - Kia Houhia ai te Rongo (Hold fast to the 'huakau' - that peace may be established)

The kaupapa of the training is focused on learning the principles and values taught within the martial arts, (i.e., discipline, health, protection, self-improvement, confidence, self-esteem, and self-mastery) thereby, enabling the student to walk and reflect in daily life those principles of peace that are taught within the school. The ultimate purpose is to establish peace within the families, homes and communities of this nation and the world.

Haukū-Rangi is the name of the weaponry school and is open to all students and others who may be interested and committed to training (male and female), as well as, living the kaupapa. Testing dates are held every three months and students are expected to attend a minimum number of days to be eligible to grade.


Overall it was an enjoyable event and Rockquest sure opened our eyes!

Good luck and may you achieve all that you set your heart on.







Our airplay and reputation has been steadily increasing, as we spearhead a new movement in school based recording.


