

FROM THE ARCHIVES:

Who are these people? What year did they attend THS?

Kia ora, kia orana, talofa lava, and greetings to you all,

It has been my pleasure to work in guidance counselling at Tokoroa High School this year, joining a team of people dedicated to promoting the best for our young people.

To introduce myself – my name is Yvonne Evans. I come from a background of living in around Rotorua most of my life. I have two adult sons, one married, who also live in Rotorua. My professional background is primary teaching for over 30 years. For the last 14 years of my teaching I was the Principal of a special school dealing with students and their families challenged by learning, social, emotional and physical health issues. Since 2000 I have been a student at the University of Waikato completing a Master of Counselling in 2005. As part of my training as a counsellor I have worked in schools and at Te Akatea Iwi Tauawhi Trust in Rotorua for two and half years, working with adults, families, couples and young people. My training in narrative therapy allows me to work with issues such as relationships, bereavement, anger management, dealing with feelings, self-harm, suicide, sexuality, family circumstances and behaviour management. At present I am studying at Auckland University of Technology in post-graduate study in mind/body healthcare, which brings another dimension to my work as guidance counsellor.

I am available to work with students, staff and families, helping them to discover what they want from life and how they prefer to live. My job is to support people to live they way they want. As part of my job I have an ethical responsibility to maintain people's privacy and confidentiality. At times, this can be frustrating for parents and caregivers involved with young people. Parents and staff do refer young people for counselling. However, students must give me permission to disclose or share any information exchanged in our sessions.

Since I have been at the school I have been working on developing the wellness centre. Our quest for a doctor on-site has been fruitless at this stage but we continue to seek one out. At this stage we get outstanding support from our Public Health Nurse Maureen Ledger through her weekly clinic. In addition, I work with Glenys Ackerman, RTLB, running a support group for younger students on a weekly basis, and am in the process of training peer mediators to provide further assistance for our students. As a sideline I also utilise my interest and experience in special abilities working with the Gifted and Talented group of students each week.

In closing, I would like to say how much I have enjoyed meeting so many inspiring and talented young people. The support I have received from the senior staff and staff in general is greatly appreciated, as is the warm welcome I received from students at the beginning of the year, right from the very first day. Your aroha is appreciated. I look forward to meeting more of you and helping make a difference to more lives.


Gwen Tutors Popular Greeting Cards Course




Science Road show


They started off acting pretty intrigued in the school of Tokoroa, asking the chosen students the basis in what goes on. They were interested in the main attractions and things that separate Tok from

National Certificate of Computing (Level 2)

By the end of the academic year at least ten Year 12 students will complete the 40 generic computing credits required to achieve the National Certificate in Computing

at Level 2. These students are to be congratulated for their dedication to coursework and assessment completion during lesson time, as well as their high level of attendance.

Waiariki Digital Photography Night Classes

Seven Year 12 and 13 computing students have attended free digital photography night classes at the Waiariki Polytech, Tokoroa Campus. Again, the additional effort made by these students has ensured that they achieve the maximum benefit from the education opportunities presented to them.

Gateway Multimedia Design Course

Every Friday for eight weeks, ten students from Tokoroa High School attended a multimedia design course paid for by the STAR/Gateway scheme. Image and sound manipulation, animation creation and presentation design were the main focus of this worthwhile course.

Year 10 Computing Achievement

The Year 10 computing option course has been changed to a one-semester (six month) course. During the first semester all students achieved NCEA Level 1 credits with two students (Serena Olsen and Deearna Dewhurst) achieving 15 credits each. The second course will also have the opportunity to achieve up to 15 Level 1 credits in computing/information management. Such achievement allows students to 'get ahead' and accumulate Level 2 computing credits in Year 11 and Level 3 credits in Year 12. This allows more opportunity for participation in specialist computing courses offered by Tokoroa High School and tertiary institutions in Year 13.

2007 Plans

All courses will continue to be reviewed and updated by Department staff so that students are provided with the best opportunity to enhance their skills and achievement in computing. Media design skills will be incorporated in appropriate units to ensure that students transfer their creative talents into producing first class, commercially acceptable documents.

The two replacement computer suites are expected to be completed and fully equipped by the end of 2007.

Many thanks to the fantastic young people, our students, who make the Computing Department so successful. Take care over the summer break. We look forward to sharing learning with many of you again.



Petra Bagust talked about her talkative nature, and that caring enough to be different.


Stephen Tindall taught us, never take credit for yourself, inspire action, and they will go far.




Eight thirty was the moment for Hayden Reyngoud and Aimee Sutherland. Our Romeo and Juliet, they really did look in loooooooooove.


inside the classroom we were sending the message to I have enjoyed watching the progress of the year group, they have all made mistakes but they have also all

Hi, I'm Chrystal and I'm going to talk to you about bullying and how to get help to make it stop.

Nobody can be sure how much bullying goes on in schools but what we do know is that bullies exists in all kinds of schools, from primary right through to high school.

Being bullied can be a living nightmare, and I know that. The victims are often people without much self confidence and are likely to lose belief in themselves and become more isolated.

It is also a known fact that a number of young people have committed suicide as a result of being bullying because they can no longer stand it.

There are many different ways of being horrible to someone and some are more obvious then others.

Calling someone names, shouting at them, making nasty threats or spreading nasty rumors about them are all forms of verbal bullying. Someone who's being bullied in this way can end up dreading going to school everyday and losing all there self confidence

Bullies often pick there victims because there's something slightly different about them. They might decide to hassle someone because they are small, or wear glasses or maybe they have an unusual

But these aren't the only reasons a person is singled out for bullying, some victims feel small, different and insecure, basically they don't feel very good about themselves. If you're a victim of any kind of bullying, one of the most important ways with dealing with it is to learn how to feel good about yourself. If someone doesn't like you for some reason, that's there problem, not yours.

all your good qualities. Being thoughtful, kind and fun to be with. Even if the bullies try to tell you differently. Another way with dealing with it is to recognise your feelings. Which is not always easy to own up to feeling left out at school or that a friend has let you down.

A lot of bullies will try to pick a fight with you, by laying the blame on you. They might accuse you of staring or something like that. If so, don't do anything that they can use as a excuse to start a fight with you. Because that's what they want.

The best thing you could do is just walk away. You could try talking yourself out of a situation. Stand up to the bully by pointing out just because they don't like you, it doesn't always have to end up in a fight. If you don't look upset or scared, you got a better chance of getting away. As with physical bullying the most effective way with dealing with it is to, stay calm, don't react and look confident.

You could try turning the whole thing into a joke. There are many different reasons why people get bullied. Some reasons are because you're big for your age, small for your age, have ginger hair, have shabby clothes or clothes that are way to smart.

No one should have to suffer bullying and there is nothing wrong with asking for help. You have the right to tell and you must keep on telling until you find someone who takes the whole issue seriously. Don't be put of by anyone who says your being a wimp!

Remember bullying can only work if victims and their friends remain silent. It might help to get moral support from a friend or from someone who has seen you been bullied. But in order to stop the bullying once and for all, you need to get adults involved. Finding an adult you can trust can help in several different ways.

For a start, if you're a victim of any kind of bullying, you'll probably feeling angry, frustrated, frightened and hurt. Your confidence might be at an all time low. You may even blame yourself for what's happened and not being able to stop it. A sympathetic adult can give support but just listening to you pour out your feelings. Both bullies and there victims are often people who lack self confidence and find it hard to make friends. Usually the people who have very few friends and who don't belong to a group end up being bullied. On the other hand, those doing the bullying are often people who feel that it is only by behaving in a hard or tough way so that they can earn the friendship of

Either way, friends play an important role in our lives. Some people find it very hard to make friends and end up feeling lonely as a result. Shy people sometimes find it impossible to get the courage up to talk to When you're under fire, try thinking about someone new. Others might be different in some way, which for no good reason make people dislike them. For example. They may be overweight, less developed then others in there class or they may wear braces. None of these things means that a person is not nice or fun to be with. The problem is that they may not be given the chance to show that underneath they are the same as everyone else.
