From the Principal's Desk

Kia Ora, Kia Orana, Talofa Lava, Malo e Lelei, Goeie Dag, Ni Hao, Namaste, Greetings.

2013 has been notable for the amount of progress made in the development and implementation of strategies to improve student achievement.

The Board of Trustees rewards scheme to boost the numbers achieving in both External and Internal NCEA assessments has been a huge success. We saw marked increases in the number of students attending external exams in late 2012 and indications are is that these numbers will be replicated in 2013. The quality of the credits gained with subject endorsements this year is the highest since NCEA was introduced.

With Ministry of Education support (Dr Sally Scott and Glenn Rowsell), we worked to develop the school's evaluative capability in assessment of student achievement. Interventions were placed for those students 'at-risk' of not achieving, including the establishment of a literacy professional development programme for all staff. Dr Scott noted in her final report on the Change and Improvement Literacy Plan that "Leaders have established a robust system with processes through which accurate, strategic and consistent judgements are made about student achievement, progress and 'next steps' in writing".

To further push our work with literacy, two appointments were made as Literacy and Numeracy coordinators. These positions were created to specifically improve the rate of attainment of level one literacy and numeracy.

There was the introduction of Operation Evidence, a Literacy and Numeracy achievement strategy which features the collection of evidence across various curriculum areas.

Analysis of individual progress at year 9 and 10 levels has become better and even possible with the introduction of the Junior Diploma this year. EasTTle has become the main formative assessment tool used with year 9 and 10 students. Major work has been done in the Mathematics department in terms of EasTTle usage.

Continuation of high quality analysis of NCEA results has taken place. A small but significant group of Year 13 students will sit Scholarship papers in 2013. Tracking of NCEA level 2 students takes place each week, in order to meet the government's goal that 85% of 18 year olds will have attained NCEA level 2 by 2017. Year 12 and 13 students who failed to gain their appropriate NCEA level or Literacy/Numeracy requirements in 2012 have support mechanisms in place this year.

The numbers of staff involved in providing extra tutorials for students has grown significantly over the year. Especially heartening has been the rapid rise in the numbers of students participating in these tutorials.

We are further exploring the notion of contextual learning. Exploring methods of increasing student engagement and learning in all classes. "Tran striding towards a culture of learning excellence".

To better support student learning, our property development programme has seen the refurbishment of the social sciences and art classrooms. The demolition of old buildings, such as F.block and plans to replace these with new quality classrooms. New buildings attract new students into the school and breeds a new air of optimism. Our new school uniform has been eyecatching and definitely set us apart from other schools in the district.

Our students, ably supported by staff, again exhibited their strengths in a variety of cultural, arts and sporting arenas this year.

- The inaugural Tokoroa High School 'Wearable Arts and Fashion Show' was an outstanding success and a highlight for the local community.
- For the second year running, our Puna Vai Ora group won the "Pasifik by Nature" cultural performance competition for secondary schools in the Waikato and Bay of Plenty.
- Following a successful Art exhibition in 2012, the Art and Music departments this year combined in holding an Art exhibition and Music show. Our students were able to perform musical numbers and display their artwork.
- Dionne Treadaway continued her outstanding performances in Athletics (intermediate girls 100m and 200m) at the North Island Secondary Schools championships. Dionne will compete at the NZ Secondary Schools championship in Hamilton during December along with new student Tyro Hewett (triple jump).
- As in 2012, Camelia Cook again won a woman's National title in 8-Ball.
- The Netball A team played competitively in the NZ Secondary Schools National tournament in Auckland to attain a 6th placing in their grade.
- The 1st XIII rugby league team came 6th in the NZ Secondary School Nationals. Mr Billy Maea received the manager of the tournament award for the second year running.
- Joseph Manu played for the Sydney Roosters under 18 side in the SG Ball competition. He also gained selection in the NZ Secondary Schools team
- Weyan Hewett and Ezekiel Cooper made NZ Maori sides.
- Mana Tepana gained selection in the National Ki-O-Rahi team.
- Holly Petera and Kristian Wood won Gold at the NZ Taekwondo national championships.
- All four of our rugby teams played in the first division of their respective grades in the Waikato secondary schools competition.
- Our school was well represented in local and regional competitions in hockey, soccer, netball and touch.







A big thank you to the staff and parents/caregivers for supporting our students in their various activities.

I thank the members of our Board of Trustees led by Board Chair, Graeme Dewhurst. Ernest Appel, Tracey Marama-Lyon, Maria Te Kanawa, Vanessa Letoa-Palea, Marama Tahapehi, Dean Tereu, Manisha Saini for serving the school so passionately. I thank our senior leadership team, Margot Crate, Butch Rothman, Brian Reid and Darnel Manu for their hard work and commitment. I also thank our school staff, both teaching and support for their efforts in assisting our students to achieve. Many give up their free time – often away from their families – in order to provide opportunities for our young people.

Bereavements are an incredibly difficult time and I wish to express heart-felt sympathy from our school community to all who have suffered loss this year.

I thank our parents/caregivers for the trust you have placed in Tokoroa High School as the learning institution for your child. I believe that we are a people centred school and will always work to do the best we can for your child.



The greatest things in life come from the things that you fail at and things that hurt you the most.






















Mission On!

Tokoroa High School's had a Mission On team for the last seven years. There are many ways to prepare for exams and often, education outside of the classroom provides an excellent opportunity for students to experience the concepts they have learnt, in 'real life' situations.

The Year 13 biology students of 2013 will be examined on their knowledge of animal behaviour and human evolution. As part of their exam preparation, the class travelled to Hamilton Zoo to observe the interactions between different species of animals, as well as learn about the differences between hominds (bipedal primate mammals).

We started our day with an 'eye to eye' encounter with the chimpanzees. The students were able to observe the chimps up close and learn about their behaviour. It became quickly apparent that chimps find it hilarious to blow 'raspberries' at their keeper through the bars of their enclosure and it was intriguing to see how intimate and playful the chimps are with each other. Just like humans, chimps like to play fight and can get quite scrappy with each other. It was amazing to hear their extensive vocal range during these interactions. The students then spread out food for the chimps and got to observe them making tools from sticks, which allowed them to get food out of small holes.

We then walked around the zoo and observed the behaviour of the other animals (which unfortunately, included a lot of huddling under shelters, due to the rain) before heading to a presentation about the various animals at the zoo. It was fascinating to learn that chimps in an overseas zoo used to stockpile rocks when their keeper wasn't looking, which they then threw at visitors to their enclosure. The keepers at Hamilton Zoo are careful not to leave things like buckets or rakes in their enclosure, as everything left behind is examined carefully and destroyed or used as a weapon. The students were able to examine

destroyed, or used as a weapon. The students were able to examine the skulls of various hominids and had an opportunity to ask questions.

It was an interesting day and comments made by the students indicate that they learnt a lot, as well as had a good time. Personally, I found the chimp encounter fascinating as well as being extremely educational and I hope to repeat this trip in the future.












Year 13 HisTorY TriP

During term two, our history class studied the forces that drove the intertribal Musket Wars, which were New Zealand's longest and bloodiest wars. We also studied the rise of the Kingitanga or King Movement and its clashes with British forces during 1863. Our May field trip consequently included an early morning visit to the battle site of Orakau, where Rewi Maniapoto led a heroic defence against a powerful British force armed with artillery.

After a lunch break in Te Awamutu, we visited the Musket Wars battle site of Matakitaki, a huge pa sheltering 6,000 people that was attacked by a musket army under Hongi Hika in 1822. After paddling up the Waikato and then the Waipa rivers, Hong's fleet landed 4,000 warriors who stormed the fortress before killing and dispersing many of the Waikato defenders. We were taken through this protected site by Alan Reilly and Alan Hall, two excellent guides who were able to describe the pa's defences and the progress of the battle in detail.

At Te Awamutu Museum we watched parts of the New Zealand made film 'Rewi's last Stand,' before returning somewhat battle weary to Tokoroa, tired but happy.

You did so well and to make it to this level of speaking was such a great feat. We wish you all the best in the future and to aspire to diligence in all that you continue to do.

On Wednesday 27th June, I took a small, dedicated group of students to a property along the Pokaiwhenua River to plant native trees and shrubs.

The property is situated in Puketerua (in between Putaruru and Arapuni) and is regularly used by members of the public, including anglers who fish along this pristine section of the river, as well as those whole enjoy walking amongst the beauty and serenity of the native flora and fauna.

Three years ago, a power company tried to buy the property with the view of installing a generator in the river. The owners of the property, Leslie and Jenny, fought against the sale, knowing that if this initiative went ahead, the land would be ruined by the development of new roads, buildings and the destruction of the beautiful waterfall which is a highlight to all visitors to the area. Leslie and Jenny won their fight to keep the land and have since worked to preserve and maintain it.

After a morning of planting, the students enjoyed a lunch of savoury scones and cake (courtesy of our lovely hosts) and they learnt the importance of their hard work. On one hand, planting trees and shrubs preserves the land by preventing erosion and helping to clean the waterways, as plant roots absorb the nutrients that would otherwise end up in the river, polluting it. The plants also attract birds and other animals and an increase in tui and bellbirds has already been noted in the area. On the other hand, preserving the land ensures that it can be enjoyed by many generations to come.

Overall, the plan is to plant 1000 trees and shrubs along the river banks. The students of Tokoroa High School contributed approximately 200 towards this goal, each one blessed with the prayer...

'Kia tipu tonu mo ake, ake, ake'.





We all had major surgery and had to go through serious rehabilitation which is still on going. It has definitely been a slow healing process and our bodies will never be the same.






I also encourage parents to encourage their child's learning by challenging them to read often, so that they are able to make the most of their learning opportunities.

This year in the mathematics department, we have tried to implement some different strategies and incorporate activities that were more meaningful and fun, into our programme. To do this, we have focused on teaching maths in real-life contexts which have been able to help students make stronger connections to their learning and the real world. In Term One we joined with the PE department and held a Year 11 PE and Maths camp at Lake Whakamaru. Students were able to participate in activities that targeted specific PE units and numeracy units. We had an awesome time, lots of fun and more importantly the kai was great! Kavari, Te Oranga, Jarvaryn and Devon took Mr Manu eeling in the river during their security rounds, while a group of us counted the spuds back in the kitchen with Mr Tahau and worked out the volume of water needed for a good, decent boil up.

We also had an exciting term two where students learnt how to calculate the area and perimeter of a marsh mellow tower. Students were required to build a free-standing tower with only marsh mellows and skewers. After many unsuccessful attempts they worked out that the best way to do this was to build a square based pyramid and keep adding to this pyramid with a whole lot of other square based pyramids on different levels.

We've also looked at maths in sports. Our sports men and sports women were able to learn out on the field while training for their 100 m sprints, how to calculate their speed using formula. In preparation for their 3 km run, they also learnt how to calculate the distance they covered in metres and convert this into kilometres.

Cooking waffles gave us a hands on approach to measurement and it was definitely a highlight. One of the things we learnt was that it is vital for students to READ a recipe carefully before mixing together ingredients. Thankfully, we were able to adjust the error and improved our calculations to ensure that our waffle batter was at is should've been. Students brought in further resources such as chocolate sauce, cream and fruit, which ensured that our mathematical experience also provided a great tasting experience.

All in all, this is just a taster as to one of the new directions that we are taking in our department and hopefully students will be able to make stronger connections and realise just how valuable maths is.

The Science Department is always looking to inspire and motivate students. This year we set up a Facebook page for every class (go to www.facebook/Thssci), where students and teachers can share classroom activities. Our new teachers bought new experiences such as the extremely popular rat dissection, the "Physics of Kendo" and chocolate snowballs. Our trial of tablets is continuing and we hope to have students bringing their own devices to school to link into the school Wi-Fi in 2014 when the new fibre optics is up and running.

We are extremely proud of our OUSSA student Javden-Lee Slater who was selected to participate in the prestigious Otago University Advanced School Sciences Academy. This involved Jayden-Lee being flown to Dunedin twice during his holidays where he worked on high level physics experiments with other students from around New Zealand under the guidance of Otago University professors.

We have extended Science outside the The Science staff were members of the STARS Camp. BUILDING CONSTRUCTION PRE-TRADE

The focus is on gaining the BCATS Pre-trade training certificate in building construction. The students worked hard and completed at least four practical projects, including one school project as well as completing their individual projects. Some students gained extra work experience through the Gateway program.

DESIGN VISUAL COMMUNICATION (DVC)

In today's ever changing world, the work force requires more designers and CAD (Computer Aide Design) technicians. An education in DVC (Graphics) can better prepare students for the future work force. It is strongly advised that students study this subject if they are considering entering a technical trade, architecture, engineering or university. Projects involve spatial design of houses and kitchens, or product design such as mobile phones and electric cars.

MECHANICAL ENGINEERING TECHNOLOGY (MET)

Students begin at year 9 and are encouraged to continue an engineering pathway through years 10-12. Over these three years, students have the opportunity to gain a Level 2 certificate in Mechanical Engineering.

HOSPITALITY

We started the Tok-Kai Café for the students to gain valuable real world experience in this subject and many students are showing great promise in the catering and hospitality field. The student's catered for many sporting events and the



2013 Principal's Conference. They also catered for 150 people at the Wearable arts event. 2014 will see the introduction of Level Three Hospitality.






This was my 3rd and final year helping design Tahi 2013! As I look back on the previous years I have done, I think of how ugly my designs used to be and how much it has improved year after
