Kia Ora, Kia Orana, Talofa Lava, Malo e Lelei, Goeie Dag, Ni Hao, Namaste, Greetings.

**In 1969**, fifty years ago, I was a form three student (year 9) at Tokoroa High School. I was one of 351 third form students, who were disbursed through 11 tutor classes. There were 38 of us in my form class 3-2. There were 277 form 4 (year 10) students, 274 form 5 (year 11) students, 83 form 6 (year 12) students, 22 form 7 (year 13) students. A total of 1007 students in the sole Tokoroa secondary school.

That first year at high school was a very happy time, filled with memories of play and laughter and learning. But it was also a school world that was, to some extent, in stark contrast to what we experience now. Looking back I remember the weekly assemblies as very formal occasions, with the Principal, Deputy Principal and Senior Assistant Mistress dressed in university gowns. In those assemblies, we sang patriotic English songs such as 'land of hope and glory' and 'I vow to thee, my country'. For a long time, I really believed that God Save the Queen was our national anthem, whilst thinking that God Defend New Zealand was just an ordinary hymn. I think that there was a Kapa Haka group and a Cook Island dance group around then but they were not as visible or as 'loud and proud' as the groups are today and I can never remember a powhiri.

The 1969 Board of Governors consisted of principal Tom Ryan as Board secretary, six parent representatives, and a representative from the Matamata county council, the Tokoroa county borough, the Education board and Tokoroa Intermediate School. In today's terms, that would mean a representative from the South Waikato district council, the Waikato regional council, the ministry of education and intermediate school joining the parent representatives and principal on the Board.

School subjects for third formers were, mathematics, English, science, social studies, physical education, art, technical drawing, metal-work, wood-work, music, cooking, clothing, typing. As well as those subjects previously mentioned, senior school options also included history, geography, French, biology, commercial practice, human biology, homecraft, bookkeeping, German, physics, chemistry, general science (nutrition), and applied mathematics. The senior qualifications were School Certificate, Higher School Certificate and University Entrance. Today we have NCEA which includes subjects such as digital technology, computer video design, Te Reo Maori, Cook Island Maori, Samoan, Japanese, dance, professional sports pathways and services academy.

My third form year was also significant for I encountered my best teacher at Tokoroa High School. Although he was only here at the school for term one of 1969, I can still distinctly remember his teaching to this day, 50 years and two terms later. He came from India and rather appropriately, his name was Mr Joy. His science lessons always started the same way; lining up outside the classroom, a check on uniform, a check on pens and book and then marched into class. Then roll call, with our names called out as they were written in the class list, with surname first followed by christian name. Then rote learning, where we would each stand individually and recite some scientific formula. Mr Joy was strict but also had a good sense of humour and often used it to get his message across. I remember one day making an error when reciting the periodic table. Quick as a flash he said...

*"Ford William, today your brain is very tired, tomorrow have breakfast, then you will remember the periodic table".* 

My greatest time in school was, not surprisingly, in PE. The teachers would take out the 10 best athletes and they would have their lesson in the gym with the best PE teachers. The rest of us, 60 to 70 boys, would troop out on to the fields with a single teacher and play rugby. There was one ball, one game with thirty plus players on each team and we played in all weather conditions, frost, rain, hail or shine. We loved it and I never wagged PE.

There were the extra-curricular sports, indoor basketball, outdoor basketball (netball), athletics, cricket, volley-ball, hockey, tennis, swimming, rugby, cross-country, badminton, soccer. There were the clubs; madrigals (?), brass band, liberal studies (!), red cross, crusaders (?), library. There was the 1969 Miss Tokoroa High contest which was won by, one of my year group, a third form student.

1969 also brought memorable music and sounds. I remember these songs being played at school:



• 'Bad Moon rRsing' by Creedence Clearwater Revival – Our music teacher Mr Saunders would point to his balding head, every time that song was played.

•'The Worst That Could Happen' by the Brooklyn Bridge - We were always worried

about getting in trouble with our parents for coming home late from school

• *Everyday People*' by Sly and the Family Stone – We were just everyday kids from culturally diverse everyday families growing up in Tokoroa.

•'In the Year 2525' by Zager and Evans - We used to think that was so well into the

future, but the song foretold a scary future for mankind. What has Greta Thunberg been saying about climate change?

There was corporal punishment, boys got caned and girls got the strap. It is so good that we don't have these anymore, as there's enough violence and brutality in today's world.



Yes there were differences and yet there are similarities between 1969 and 2019. The school motto "In Spe Fortitudo" remains as does the strong focus upon academic achievement. Although in 1969, the school leaving age was 15 and finding a job or gaining an apprenticeship were the main vocational goals for most students. At that time, there were only 22 students in form 7, all of whom intended to go to university. This year, 2019, we have 83 students in year 13, each with a range of career aspirations; including university, IT industry, apprenticeships, hospitality, tourism, the military and professional sports pathways. Success has been seen in the latter, with former students Amy Turner, Joseph Manu and Zane Tetevano starring on our TV screens whilst playing for the Brisbane Broncos and Sydney Roosters NRL franchises.

**Mrs Jenny Hainsworth**, began as the SENCO of Tokoroa High School in 2005. I developed a strong friendship with her almost immediately as I grew to realise that she was a very strong advocate for our students. In particular, students who had special learning needs. Over a ten year period from 2007, Jenny also sat as part of the senior leadership of the school.

She was many things in this school but I will always remember her as being;



- a respected leader who gave us so much valued support and advice
- a person who always saw the good in others
- a person who always had the best interest of the student at the core of everything that she did
- a mentor for me and other staff as she had been an ex-principal herself and understood the complexities of the job
- a person who loved God and her Catholic faith
- a wise person that we could confide in
- a person who was passionate about literacy
- a person who was passionate about learning

During her time at Tokoroa High School, Jenny worked with many students at both ends of the spectrum. There were students who were deemed as gifted and talented (GATE) as well as those students with special learning needs. Jenny and I were the school's GATE representatives at Ministry of Education seminars and meetings during the 2007 to 2009 time period. Initially, I couldn't understand why I was in GATE, until Jenny stated that I was already doing GATE work in my PE subject area, but probably didn't realise it. I also used my position as HOD PE to support her work with students with learning needs. Jenny mentioned to me once that she had difficulty in getting students to attend her one on one reading lessons. We devised a plan whereby the students who loved sport were only allowed to participate in PE if they had attended Jenny's lessons and were making progress in their reading. The faster that they progressed through their work meant that the faster they returned to their PE classes.

Around 2006 and 2007, Jenny and I used the Matarawa teaching block. She was working with Te Kahui Whetu at one end of the block, whilst I taught at the other end. It was there that I learnt to appreciate the many hours of after school work that she completed. We enjoyed some comical situations at times when I went to set the security alarm for the Matarawa block. I can vividly recall Jenny coming out of her room to call to me "Willie, I'm still here working. You can un-set the alarm". She would follow this comment with her really infectious laugh. Jenny spent so many hours after school, that she would have become a wealthy woman if she was paid at an hourly rate.

But I believe Jenny has enabled a number of us to become wealthy. She has made us wealthy through the knowledge that she has given, the experiences that she has shared, the blessings of her bountiful wisdom and her boundless generosity. It is her legacy that she has given to Tokoroa High School and those memories will remain for students, staff, parents and for a certain PE teacher who became principal of Tokoroa High School. One of my favourite sayings is "great things happen in schools and organisations when you have good people". Thank you Jenny for making great things happen at Tokoroa High School. Farewell and God Bless.

This year has been noticeable for the number of people from our community who have passed away. To our year 13 students and other departing students, I thank you all for your contributions to Tokoroa High School. I wish each of you, all the very best for the future.






















### TOUGH GUY TOUGH GAL


## TOKOROA HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT COUNCIL 2019































# TREE PLANTING

Thank you to the staff who attended on the night and anyone else who helped to make the ball a great success. We are grateful for all of and look forward to bringing you another exciting ball in 2020.






































































































































## TOKU TŪ PASIFIKA "My Pacific Heritage"





Needless to say, Nga Manu Korero National Speech Competition 2019 was AMAZING. I have spent half of my high school life emerged in this unique, culturally eye-opening experience where so many passionate young people are able to share their perspective of the events that take place in Aotearoa. This reason is exactly why I love Nga Manu Korero.

I don't know if it's because I'm in my final year, but this year's national Manu Korero, has been one of the greatest experiences I've had so far and for many reasons. Firstly, our accommodation this year was only 500m away from the venue and we didn't have to pay for parking (it also limited our chances of being late.....again). Secondly, It was so motivating having the chance to be surrounded by people who have the same passion and fire as I did and knowing that they are just as willing to fight for what they believe in. Lastly, to be one of the few people to have this opportunity to share their thoughts with our country.

I chose the speech topic 'What is the use of Knowledge without action?'

It took almost two terms for me to feel content with this speech topic. I ended up writing the speech within 3 weeks of the regional competition and even though it took a long time, I'm extremely proud of the message that I was able to share. I spoke about how we let fear, our educational system, our lack of knowledge and society restrict us from putting our knowledge to action. But at the end of the day, the only thing that matters is if we have faith in ourselves, that we CAN make changes with the knowledge we currently have and that we do not need to source knowledge that is unnecessary. I placed 2nd in my prepared speech and placed first in Impromptu, receiving 100 marks from all the judges which was unexpected and overwhelming.

We proceeded to Nationals where I delivered my impromptu titled 'Don't let fear decide your future'. Each Speaker was given 5 minutes to choose a speech topic from a list of 5 topics, they then presented a 2-3 minute speech on their chosen topic. I correlated this topic around maori history. I wanted to speak about our ancestors and their inability to let fear decide the future for their people. That we must learn from our ancestors and use fear as motivation to create a brighter world for the next generation. It was hard delivering this message, because the auditorium was HUMONGOUS and I didn't know if some of the jokes that I made would get an audience reaction (thankfully they did, it would have super awkward if they didn't). But the moment before I walked onto the stage, I realised that I needed to get out of my comfort zone, I needed to feel passionate about the message that I am spreading. So as soon as I walked onto the stage, I felt an immense amount of pressure lift off my shoulders and I was free to influence, motivate and inspire everyone in the auditorium. I left that stage feeling renewed, refreshed and sparked with a new energy and the rest of my week was spent creating bonds with amazing people.. I know it is cheesy, but it was the truth, this experience inspired me to aspire to greater heights and to live outside of my comfort zone

You see, earlier this year I didn't feel motivated to do Manu Korero. But now, I am so glad that I didn't let my lack of motivation prevent me from taking this unique opportunity otherwise I would've had some major regrets. I'm talking 'give your food away even though you're still hungry' kind of regrets. Never give up an opportunity that rarely presents itself because it may be the last time you will ever see it. It was such an honour to make it to Nationals and stand on the same stage as these passionate Rangatahi and have a platform to share my own opinions, my perspectives and an opportunity to be heard. I'm extremely thankful

for Mr Ngapo for helping me grow as an individual. There were many times where we disagreed on certain topics and had different perspectives on learning methods, but had I not received mentoring from Ngapo, I wouldn't be as confident in speaking like I am now. I cannot wait to see what the future has instore for Tokoroa High School and their Nga Manu Korero journey. If there is anyone wanting to participate in this incredible experience, but are too afraid, I encourage you to 'not let fear decide your future' nor 'let fear restrict you from reaching your full potential. 

Marlene spoke of the History of the Holocaust and led the students on an informative tour of their Synagogue. Desiree talked to the students about her father's life during the Holocaust, and his survival. The most fascinating part of her story was the fact that it was down to sheer luck and a series of 'miracles' that her father survived these atrocities. The students asked some fantastic questions, which were well received by Desiree and Marlene. While in the Holocaust centre, students were shown original gowns worn in the concentration camps, books that survived the book burnings of 1933, pictures drawn by children while in the Auschwitz death camp, and many other historical documents. We thank the Holocaust Centre in Wellington for giving up your time to educate our students – this was an experience many will never forget, and they also commented that we had been one of the best behaved and informed groups, which is a testament to our History program here at Tokoroa High School.

Also on our trip, students were able to visit Te Papa National Museum, with a focus on the Gallipoli exhibition, which students had studied as part of their Level 2 History program last year. The students were enthralled by the exhibit, with the larger than life war models blowing their minds. We were also lucky enough to attend the open day of one of New Zealand's most prestigious Universities, Victoria University of Wellington. The students attended introductory lectures, as well as getting a feel for university life by touring the Halls of residence, Te Herenga Waka Marae and many other points of interest around the university. Several of our class are now seriously considering Victoria University as a study option in 2020. Other activities on our trip included ten-pin bowling (where Livon and 'Te Manare' were the stars, and Carmen not so much), movies and plenty of city tours! Other highlights included the 'night walks', late night karaoke (thanks Grace), the brave ones 'popping manus' off the wharf, and Mr Jowett and Kevin's chess battles! #### A 'LITTLE ROCK' OF THE BLACK CIVIL RIGHTS MOVEMENT Tokoroa High School Students meet Elizabeth Eckford

As part of our Level 1 History Curriculum, our students do an in-depth unit on the Black Civil Rights movement. To say it was a privilege to meet a hero of this movement would be a gross understatement. In 2018, Miss Chesterman and Mr Jowett were lucky enough to meet Minnijean Brown, one of the Little Rock 9. This year, perhaps the most famous of the Little Rock 9, Miss Elizabeth Eckford, travelled to New Zealand to share her stories of racism and segregation during the Civil Rights movement. Accompanying her was Dr Eurydice Stanley, who shared her stories of police profiling and brutality. 40 students across year 11, 12 and 13 were privileged enough to get to hear stories from Miss Eckford and Miss Stanley, documenting Elizabeth's time at Central High School, and the trials and tribulations she faced.

Our school was gifted 3 copies of Elizabeth Eckford's new book, signed by Elizabeth and Eurydice, which has made a fantastic edition to our library. Miss Chesterman and Mr Jowett also had the privilege of meeting members of the Polynesian Panthers, who were instrumental in protesting the Dawn Raids of the 1970s, which is another important topic in our History Curriculum.

Many thanks go to Miss Chesterman for organising this day, and to the Social Sciences department for footing the bill to give our students a once in a lifetime experience.





# **TOKOROA HIGH SCHOOL'S** Invasion of the Waikato



In 2019, an important topic for our Level 3 History students is the Invasion of the Waikato. So during Term 2, Mr Jowett, Mr Olsen and Matua Poutapu lead our Year 13 History and Te Reo Maori students as we traced our way through the many battle sites of the 1863 invasion of the Waikato. As young historians, it was so important for us to understand the impact that this had on our area, and the way our country differs in our 'celebration' or 'commemoration' of our own history. Students were extremely fascinated to learn that many of our major towns and cities in the Waikato have buildings, roads and monuments named after some of the British who committed atrocities at such places as Rangiriri and Rangiaowhia.

On the trip, we were lucky enough to get a guided tour of the Rangiriri battle site and Uru Pa by local Iwi, where students discovered the sadness of the many beautiful English gravestones, and the sad reality of the mound where Maori were buried in a mass grave. We were also taken to re-enact part of the battle of Rangiriri, overlooking what is now State Highway One. After Rangiriri, we moved on to Ngaruawahia, where we received an impromptu but fantastic tour of Turangawaewae Marae, the home of the Kingitanga movement. Many of our students had connections to this Marae through their Whanau, Hapu and Iwi. Following this, we travelled to other sites of massacres and battles, including the very solemn site of Rangiaowhia, where Matua Poutapu recounted many of his ancestors' stories that had been passed down. We finished our trip at Orakau, where we heard about the 'Rewi's Last Stand', and the Waikato tribes escape into the King Country.

The trip was very eye-opening for many of our students. Most importantly, they were able to link events of the past to modern issues such as Ihumatao. We will continue to fight, as students at Otorohanga College did, to have the NZ Wars made a compulsory part of our curriculum.



# A Diary of a Young Girl



During Term 3, Mrs Chandra's Year 10 Social Studies class, and Mr Jowett's Year 12 History class travelled to Waikato Museum in Hamilton, for their special Anne Frank Exhibition. Nazi Germany is an important topic in our Level 2 History curriculum. Anne Frank was a

young girl who went into hiding from the Nazi's in an annex of her father's factory in Amsterdam. Just six months before the war ended, Anne and her family were discovered, and sent away to concentration camps. Anne died at the Bergen-Belsen camp in Germany.

After the war, her father (who survived) was given a diary that Anne had kept during this time. He later had it published, and it has become a global phenomenon ever since, in the way in shows the innocent perspective of war and hatred in Nazi occupied Europe. Our students were able to see original documents, informative photographs, and learn more about the story of Anne Frank.







One of the highlights of the trip was learning about the Nazi officers who were responsible for arresting the Frank family. The main officer was tracked down 18 years later, working as a police officer in Italy! A very informative day was had by all,



Swaying bridges, flying foxes, climbing nets, hanging rings, and the Tarzan jump, were just some of the obstacles that the CACTUS students had to tackle this year – and all the obstacles were 3 – 20 metres above ground!

A couple of students pushed themselves a little too far and had to be 'rescued' at level four, but they should be proud of what they achieved....it's really scary!!!!!

We would like to thank Bluelight Tokoroa and the staff at Adrenaline Forest for putting on such a fun day for us.






The tournament was held at Devoy Squash and Fitness Centre in Tauranga over 3 days, and each player had 5 games each.


This year was the first year where New Zealand Turbo Touch streamed live on their website, which gave our school the opportunity to be broadcasted not only to Tokoroa but to the world.
