From the Principal's Desk

> Tokoroa High School Mission Statement -"The Best and Highest Qualifications for All"

In 2021, despite the impact of Covid-**19 again, our school's** academic results, as measured by NCEA achievement, remained consistently high. These results are a credit to the efforts made by our staff and students along with support from our families in the community. Tracking and monitoring of NCEA results show satisfying progress for the year. Pleasingly, at Level Two and Level Three and University Entrance, our achievement rate are the second highest attained over the past nine years. Plans are in place to continue to improve our academic achievement rates in **2022, with the goal of surpassing the previous 'best' results across** all year levels.

Covid-19

Negatively in 2020 and 2021, we have witnessed the significant influence that Covid-19 has had a upon our retention of students in **the senior school. The closure of New Zealand's borders for** extended periods of time has meant that the labour pool of migrant workers from overseas has been substantially reduced throughout the country. Employment options have therefore become more freely available and many of our students have taken up job opportunities earlier than they had expected. The concern is that students are limiting their future aspirations by venturing into unskilled employment that is often lowly paid and has low levels of advancement. Research has consistently shown that education is still the most important factor towards raising aspirational levels **and improving a person's quality of life. Attainment of relevant** qualifications in High School enables a young person to continue into tertiary and vocational pathways that set them up for life.

TOKOROA HIGH SCHOOL 'CLASS OF 1971'

2021 also marked the 50-year commemoration of a tragic event that occurred on the 31st of May 1971. On that date, four Tokoroa High School students died in a car accident. Colin Emerton aged 15, Pamela Van Egmond aged 15, Kathryn McEwen aged 14 and Christina Tough aged 15 lost their lives in the crash. Three other students in the car survived the accident, including our South Waikato District Mayor Jenny Shattock (Jenny Weavers at that time). The students were all in the top streamed academic classes

in form five (year 11). They were recognised as student leaders as well as top athletes in that year group. I have vivid memories of that time. In particular, standing with many of my school mates outside the St Marks Presbyterian Church on Bridge Street, attending one of the funeral services held that day.

This year, our Mayor Jenny Shattock alongside Ken Rugg our school caretaker organised a remembrance event that began on Saturday 29 May and culminated on Monday 31 May at a service at Tokoroa High School. Jenny, Ken and I were classmates of the students who **lost their lives. Monday's remembrance service at** Tokoroa High School consisted of a Powhiri, a full school assembly, a blessing and unveiling of a memorial plaque. The day concluded with a delicious lunch prepared by Elize Lotter and her hospitality students. I thank Bishop **Billy Maea and Poutapu Winikerei for leading the school's** tribute and our school students and staff for supporting the commemoration.

We have had another great year in Stars. 
In our sessions this year, we developed a more effective way of engaging with our Year 9's, which we called 'Power Sessions'. We split the gym up into 12 stations, with three mentors at each station. The mentors have chosen a topic connected to the overall theme of the day to speak on. All of the Year 9's are already split up into 12 groups. In the 'Power Sessions', each group of Year 9's rotates through the stations and spend one minute there. After a minute, a timer calls STOP, then SWITCH, which lets everyone know that the groups have to move on to the next station. After about 20 minutes, the groups have completed all of the stations and then we have Quiz Time. In Quiz Time, the groups are given questions by the mentors that relate to their stations. The mentors did a fantastic job of their small power sessions, coming up with acronyms or catchy phrases to help connect the Year 9's to an overall important message.

Our Community Food Drive was an important highlight for us as a school. Our community have been hit hard by Covid19 and we wanted to be able to help out. We held a school mufti day, and instead of paying to wear mufti, students were asked to bring a food item. Our school collected approximately 900 food items to donate to the local Food Bank. This was a great effort by our school.

In 2014 I was assigned to run a new learning programme to help year 11 students who had learning and behaviour challenges here in Tokoroa High School. The name of this programme was initially called ABC but was changed to The Lighthouse learning programme in 2016. It was a new initiative created by our principal Mr Ford and I was charged to run it. Covering new ground it was a very experimental programme with the added challenge of helping chosen year 11 students achieve NCEA LEVEL ONE.

The type of students that were chosen for this programme relished in the fact that our programme was based on a constant timetable and not a rotating timetable which helped students to settle well into this programme. Also having our own home room or base was a great help. Consistency was a key factor in our programme which included also having the same main teacher which was myself. By myself I found it very hard but with the help of a lot of kind teachers who volunteered their time and expertise over the years we were able to find a good balance.

It was a daily grind but to achieve NCEA LEVEL ONE at the end of the year made all the hard work worth it. Students who completed the course to the very end were very satisfied achieving NCEA LEVEL ONE. In fact we maintained a 100% success rate over all the eight years the programme has been running. Unfortunately, those students who did not see the year out would fall short of the mark.

I am truly grateful for our principal Mr Ford for the wonderful and challenging opportunity to run this unique course as I have learnt so much as a teacher and how to create and adapt learning programmes. I was challenged, I was stretched in all areas of learning but I came out a better teacher and a better person for the experience. Thank you to all the teacher s who taught, who helped, who supported our programme. I am also truly grateful for all the students I was able to teach, to help and to guide over the past eight years and all the good times, the tough times and the rough times that we had but we got there in the end. COUNSELLING HIGHLIGHTS FOR 2021

We began the year working out of a very hot and airless room next to the staffroom and as it was only one space when Gaylene and I were here together on a Wednesday one of us would have to leave so the other one could have a conversation that was confidential.

However, the opening of our Health and Wellbeing Suite in March has provided us with such an amazing space to work. Although there have been one or two hic-cups we all feel so blessed to have a beautiful, purpose-built area to work in. We have incorporated the Health clinic into our space and what a difference this has made for us and our students. The nurse is here every day and the Doctor comes once a week and so we are all able to provide wrap around care and support for our students.

We have had a change in Drug and Alcohol counsellors coming into school from the beginning of Term 3. Colleen has become a senior practitioner with Care NZ and now works out of a Hamilton office. We have welcomed Caitlyn to our school and she works here on a Tuesday.

We have also been lucky to have Irene coming in most Tuesdays as she works towards getting her hours to gain full membership of our registration body NZAC.

Gaylene and Pam continue to job share – Pam Mondays-Wednesday and Gaylene Wednesday-Friday. We have continued to see large numbers of our students as they navigate high school and teenage issues. However we have also noticed an increase in the anxiety our young people are carrying as we all get



used to COVID, lockdowns,

vaccinations and not being able to travel or see our loved ones like we used to.

Tokoroa High School Year 12 Business Studies students also initiated "kaitiakitanga" project, where they started with recycling and reducing waste by starting their school greenhouse and compost. Every day a class is rostered for afternoon duties to help keep our

IS THE WAY OF THE FUTURE!

This allowed them to dabble in the world of Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM). The aim of the lab day was to introduce students to STEM and to open up their minds to possible career pathways for the future.

The event was run by the KuDos Scientific Trust, whereby scientists and industry leaders from around the region came together to share their expertise with students from all around the Waikato. The students designed health drinks, investigated some of the micro 'beasties' found in our waterways, tested their physical limits, and used lasers to test their reaction rates – just to name a few! The unanimous highlight was the ice-cream making, which always goes down a treat. A very fun day was had by all and we look forward to going back

again next year!



INTERNATIONAL CHEMISTRY QUIZ

On the 29th of July 2021, we had 23 students from Year 9 to Year 12 sit the online International Chemistry Quiz. This involved answering 30 **multiple choice questions. This tested the student's skills as they were** required to analyse graphs, complete calculations and apply their own chemistry knowledge to a variety of scenarios.

This quiz is held in 21 countries around the world and had over 95,000 students participate this year. It was fantastic to see our students taking part and challenging themselves at an international level.



SUPER FUN SCIENCE PROJECT

Mrs Lal's Year 9 Science class made giant bubbles. The ingredient list seemed bizarre, the cornflour didn't completely dissolve, didn't seem slick and slippery like store-bought bubble solution. But that did not deter Dre and his friends practising the entire class time to come up with the perfect giant bubbles.

The best weather for making bubbles is to pick a cloudy or overcast day, with high humidity and very little wind. The reason being that sunshine and wind will dehydrate your bubbles, causing them causing it to pop. Students also made their own wand. They used two drinking straws, and a length of yarn that was six to eight times longer than the length of one straw. All they needed to do was to thread the yarn through the straws, tie a knot, and they were good to go!

YEAR 9 DISSECTIONS

One of the best ways for students learn is through 'hands on' activities, but sometimes students get a little more than they bargained for.

This year, the Year Nine students got to examine cows eyes, hearts and lungs. It is always great to see students challenging themselves to bust out of their comfort zones and do something different, and this year was no exception. With scalpels in hand, students examined each part of the eye, and were surprised to learn that the lens can be used as a magnifying glass. They learnt about the tapetum – a layer of paua coloured cells attached to the retina, that reflect light back into the eye, increasing night vision for many nocturnal animals. Cool aye

As always, the heart/lungs dissection was a hit, with several students able to inflate the lungs, and see just how spongy and expandable they are. The beauty of dissections are the links that can be made between human and animal anatomy. By examining the cow, they are (sort of!) learning how parts of their own bodies function, and what they look like. I commend the students on their maturity and bravery during our practical sessions!

TOKOROA HIGH SCHOOL SERVICE ACADEMY

The Tokoroa High School Service Academy (SSA) has had an extremely busy and positive year.

At the start of the year during Term One, 10 students traveled to Waiouru military camp for a 10-day induction course, alongside six other SSA from other areas in the central north island. Working with the New Zealand Defence Force (NZDF) Youth Development Unit (YDU), students learnt a number of various skills including parade drill, physical training and adventure-based learning

During Term Two, five students were selected to take part in the SSA Basic Leadership course at Ohakea air force base in the Manawatu. For five days these students learnt a variety of different techniques to help them become more effective leaders.

11 Students also attended the SSA Bushcraft Course at Whirinaki National Forest Park. Throughout the term students had learnt various skills such as the environmental care code, pitching tents, cooking safely in the outdoors, and endurance training the 5-day course was the cumulation of all this learning.

In Term Three, two students were selected to attend the SSA Advanced Leadership course once again in Ohakea. These students were able to further refine the techniques taught to them on the Basic Leadership course. At the end of the course the students planned a formal dinner which was attended by the OC of Ohakea Airforce Base, and this was the first time that they had done this.

Halfway through the term the students were given the opportunity to get their first aid certificates however halfway through the course we went into lockdown. This meant a rescheduling once we got back, but we managed to get through it and the students got their first aid certificates.

During Week 9 of Term Three, was the SSA Adventure Challenge. This was a five day course designed to push everyone (directors included) both physically and mentally. This camp was attended by 12 other SSA from around the central North Island. This presented several challenges due to the covid restrictions that were still in place. Thanks to the efforts of the YDU the camp was still able to go ahead and was strictly monitored by the YDU to be compliant and keep everyone safe. Challenges that needed to be completed were Mountain biking, Tramping, The Tough Guy/Gal challenge, White water rafting and Mental/physical Olympics. Tokoroa High students received several compliments from the YDU staff on their resilience and perseverance during these activities.

The students in the academy have grown during the year and have learnt that what they thought were their limits, are nowhere near what they can achieve when they really push themselves. They also have become a tight knit family group who look out for each other and will help others when they see someone needing assistance.

Each of these team members running a year level, and different area of careers, and all working in together to help our students transition and move to where they want to be in the world.

There were 32 students taking part in Trades Academy in 2021, this was held off campus in their potential future might look like. a variety of places; Toi Ohomai hosted students each week in both the Tokoroa and Rotorua Campuses, some students attended Yoobee Colleges in Rotorua, and others attended noho trades at Te Whanau a Noa with Te Wananga o Aotearoa. These trades students undertook courses of study in agriculture, construction, Automotive Engineering, Outdoor education, Hospitality, Hair and Beauty, computing, animation and creating digital portfolios, all these students gained practical skills in their areas of interest.

It has been fabulous to see the skillsets and personal confidence levels of our students rise as they have navigated studying at a tertiary institute, and have been very much in charge of managing themselves using bus services, and finding their way around tertiary campuses for attending their courses of learning.

A number of students participated in Gateway working at local businesses this year, Gateway is a great way for our students to explore the world of work, before leaving school. It is very easy for our rangitahi to quickly decide if the career path they think they want, is actually what they do want, there is a wonderful quote from Katherine Whitehorn which applies to Gateway "Find out what you like doing best, and get someone to pay you for it"

Our partnership with the local Police and Bluelight has continued with a Gateway Police Big Day out and Tokoroa Hospital has continued to open for our students to engage in work place work experience there.

We ran a number of work preparation courses through 2021, with students gaining

their forklift licences, barista skills, bar manager skills, workplace health and safety certificates, sports leadership among other areas that our rangitahi were interested in.

Bus trips to universities and polytechs, private learning institutes and local workplaces were engaged in and thoroughly enjoyed by all who went.

Our students attended the South Waikato Careers Expo where they were able to engage with local employers, nationwide tertiary education providers, look at a variety of careers and make connections with what

A selection of our school leavers attended a speed-meet with Business owners and Managers from over 30 different employers in the South Waikato. This was an eye-opening morning with students learning about vacancies that are open and urgently needing filling within our region - many with apprenticeships and an ability to work and stay local - which a number of our youths wish to do.

Our year 12 students attended the Teen Driver Expo and were shown how a booze bus works, how the jaws of life are used by our firemen, what happens when police attend an accident, how ambulance officers work in an accident scene, and how the three work in together. Alongside presentations on the negative outcomes of drink or drugged driving. This was an eye opening experience for many of our students.

We have been fortunate again this year to have had drivers licences funded by the SWIFT fund, this has made a big impact on our students and helped many to gain access to driving lessons, and attain their drivers licence. We would like to sincerely thank the SWIFT fund for this support of our tauira and helping them to remove barriers to future employment via having their licences prior to leaving school.

Somehow each week, we were busy! We look forward to meeting 2022 head-on and prepared to see our rangitahi flourish.
